Carole Petersen is a Professor at the William S. Richardson School of Law and the Director of the Matsunaga Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution. She teaches a range of courses both at the Law School and at the Matsunaga Institute, including International Law, the International Protection of Human Rights, International Law and Disputes, and Introduction to Human Rights: International and Comparative Perspectives.

Diane Desierto is an Assistant Professor at the William S. Richardson School of Law and the co-director of the ASEAN Law and Integration Center. Her teaching and publication interests are in international economic law (international investment, trade, finance, law and development), international human rights law, international humanitarian law. ASEAN Law, and international dispute settlement.





David Cohen is a Professor at the William S. Richardson School of Law and the founding Director of the Berkeley War Crimes Studies Center. Since 2000, he has collaborated on human rights projects in Asia with the East-West Center in Honolulu, a federally funded Asia-Pacific research center. There, he serves as Director of the Asian International Justice Initiative and as Senior Fellow in International Law. Professor Cohen teaches courses in International Law and Human Rights.
